# SURVEY BACKGROUND

The University of Liverpool wishes to assess the opinions of the adult population to provide a comprehensive, reliable and representative survey of political opinions in Northern Ireland, with particular reference to how and why electors voted in the ways they did in the 2010 general election.

The main areas of study for the research are:

- Level of interest in the General Election
- Perceived key issue on which they voted
- Parties perceived as best able to address these issues
- NI party perceived as closest to respondents views on this issue
- Voting patterns and reasons for choice of party/candidate in this election
- Voting patterns and reasons for choice of party/candidate in previous elections
- Reasons for not voting
- Attitudes to parties and leaders
- Attitudes to the economy and the parties best able to address economic issues
- Attitudes to Europe
- Attitudes to the status of NI
- Importance of selected issues to the NI electorate
- Satisfaction with the performance of the Government in relation to these issues
- Level of contact with parties prior to the election

## SAMPLING

We will use a stratified random sample for this survey.

Clustering of addresses will be used to eliminate excessive travel expenses and to provide discrete sampling points for each geographic area.

The main strength of this approach is that it enables us to broadly **compare the sample with known demographics** while maintaining an overall random sampling approach.

Representative stratification will be set for:

- Electoral Area
- Age
- Religion
- Gender

# **RESPONDENT SELECTION**

The sample will be designed to provide a full representation of adult residents (18+) across Northern Ireland.

The sampling method for this includes:

- A 1000 sample of households using a face to interview with one member of the household aged 18+ that meets the stratification required for your area
- A list of Postal Address File addresses will be provided from a sampling organisation that will provide sufficient addresses to enable successful contact with the correct number of respondents in your sampling area
- This address should be tried again up to 3 times until either an interview is achieved or a refusal is given.
- Call backs will include daytime, evening and weekend calls.
- Only when no successful interview has been achieved will a substitute address be allocated.

# INTERVIEWING

A sensitive approach to interviewing should be observed.

Please adhere to a smart dress code and make sure you are clearly identifiable to MRNI - use your MRS identification card at all times.

Following an interview, give each respondent is given a 'thank you' note.

Before you start:

- show your ID card,
- explain who has commissioned the survey and its purpose,
- stress both the randomness of selection of the respondent and the confidentiality of the interview,
- advise that the interview will be conducted in accordance with the Code of Conduct of the Market Research Society,
- give an estimate of how long the interview is likely to last 30 minutes

Please use the following opening to encourage participation:

# SAMPLE MANAGEMENT AND CHECKING OF STRATIFICATION

The sample will be monitored throughout the course of the project using our computerised sample management facility which lets us close down strata for which the required amount has already been reached.

Please keep a manual record of sample achievement as well.

Please synchronise your CAPI machines twice a week to allow us to cross check the achieved sample against the required stratification and adjust what interviews you still need to achieve.

Ensure CAPI machines are fully charged, have charging leads and spare batteries

If you have any problems with the CAPI machines or synchronising talk to Gavin.


