experienced some explicit racism such as name calling

People were living parallel lives

Studied social policy to understand this more and undertook projects eg) Women in STEM

affinity groups

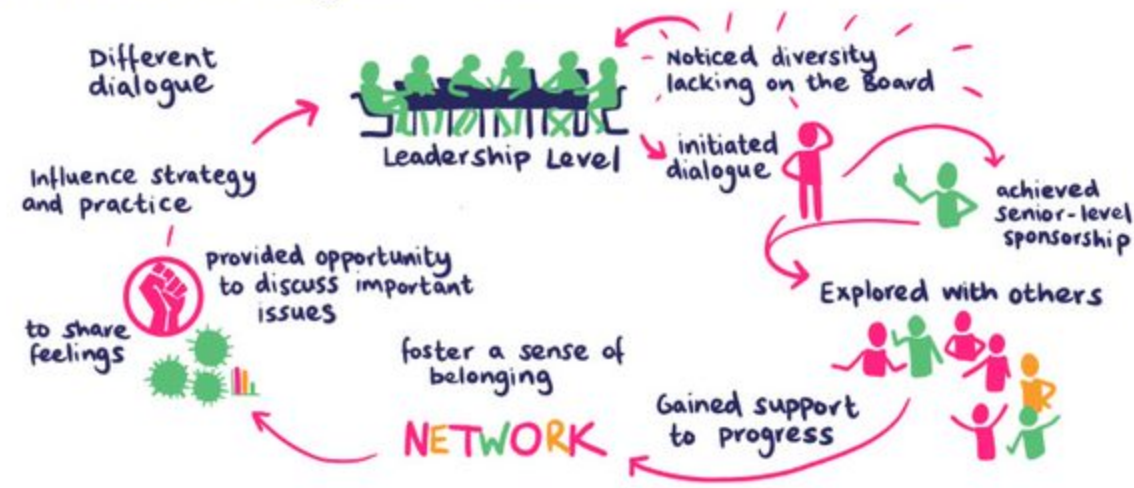
but ALL seek to bring people with a common interest TOGETHER!
